Quick Tips for Supporting Low-Income Students

Reducing Textbook Costs

Open Source

One strategy to make courses more affordable for students is to use open educational resources in place of high-cost textbooks. Open educational resources, or OER, are any educational materials that are licensed in a way that allows them to be freely downloaded, used, distributed, and revised. You can find high quality open textbooks on sites like OpenStax, Open Textbook Library, and OER Commons.

Other options for students looking to reduce textbook costs:

- → The Borrow Direct system to access material from other libraries (free)
- → The reserve corridor Mural Room (*free*)
- → FYSEP's small borrowing library of donated texts for popular courses (*free*): https://tinyurl.com/ycs9xjov
- Renting of books through Wheelock Bookstore and online companies like Amazon or Chegg
 Students need to email profs 2-3 weeks ahead of time for the syllabus so that there is time to order texts to rent
- → Upperclass students who may have taken the course before to borrow/buy books
- \rightarrow Previous editions where acceptable (often the previous year's does work)
- → Ask that professors know the cost of any textbook they require.

Directing Students to Resources

Financial Aid Emergency Fund:

Sensitivity to Range of Financial Background In Class

Recognition (Embrace) of Socioeconomic Differences Among Students in the Class

Students particularly value when professors acknowledge and affirm that a variety of financial backgrounds and financial situations are present in the room. Socioeconomic diversity can be invisible but should not be ignored.
